DISCUSSION ITEMS

Appointments (Brown)

Council members discussed Draft #5 of the Appointments Policy and decided on final edits. The final version will go to Council for approval at the next regular meeting.

Commercial Rehab (Huebler)

City Manager Huebler discussed the Commercial Rehab District process and the fact that it is limited by PA 210 of 2005 to exemptions before December 31, 2025. Council would like to proceed with establishing the district to allow exemptions before the expiration.

Housing (Cabala)

Council members discussed the provided inventory of available properties that would be usable for affordable housing projects. Cabala would like to connect with Muskegon County and local non-profit organizations to see how other communities address this type of project.

TIFA Operating (Brown)

Council member Brown expressed displeasure with the TIFA Board decisions and the lack of Council approval on individual projects that fall into the TIFA district. City Manager Huebler explained how the current TIFA captures taxes to improve the downtown and that the plan will be up for expiration/renewal at the end of the year. Council would have the final decision on any renewal.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Martin Ryerson expressed interest in purchasing City properties to build affordable housing. Christina Normandin expressed displeasure with the TIFA Board.

Re: Call for Salter's resignation

My comments at the July 9, 2024 Whitehall City Council meeting regarding Mr. Salter's altercation with his neighbor and my call for his resignation were not specifically included in the meeting minutes so I am submitting them in this letter with the request that it be included in the meeting minutes for the July 23, 2024 council meeting.

I want to address a matter that should have been addressed long before now. Many of us have been witness to the mayor's aggressive manner and easily provoked temper during council meetings. In May, he was involved in an incident where he admittedly punched a woman in the face such that she fell to the ground. This was in retalliation for allegedly being punched by her in his back, which his neighbor denies doing.

This display of complete lack of self-control, ending in violence, is simply unacceptable from a public official. It not only reflects poorly on him as an individual but is damaging to our city, our council and our community. This show of angry aggression sends the very dangerous message that such behaviour is permissable. It is not.

As representatives of this council and voices for our community, we have to address this issue. I want the mayor to take responsibility for his action. Therefore, in what I believe to be in the best interest of our community, I call for Steven Salter to resign from his position as mayor, from city council and from any board on which he holds a seat.

I want to begin by expressing my heartfelt compassion for everyone involved in this unfortunate incident. In conclusion, my vote against the motion would have been a commitment to fair process, stability, and the overall well-being of our city. I would like us all to reaffirm our commitment, as elected local officials, to treat each other with civility and respect. I will try to do so myself. More than at any time in my memory, I feel this is needed. Let's build our community up, let's build it strong together!

Ladies and gentlemen of the City Council,

My name is Kyle Burnett, I married into this community some years ago, I am a homeowner in Whitehall, lover of - and investor in - the greater White Lake area. Thank you for taking the time to hear me out.

I stand before you today deeply concerned about the ongoing events involving our town mayor, Steve Salter, and his neighbor. As I understand the documented facts, for nearly 20 years, the Salters family - and I think this is putting it mildly - have had issues with their neighbor.

Based on my years of time spent with the Salters family, and on the evidence I have seen or has been shared with me - legal filings, judge-ordered mediation, arrest records, and witness testimony - I am of the opinion, that the long-running issues originate, and are solely perpetuated from, the neighbors side of the fence.

I believe the Salters family has a long, documented track record of their efforts to help a troubled neighbor, adding up to decades of restraint and dedication to maintaining peace and civility. Despite their best efforts to work with their neighbor, law enforcement, the courts, social services and the neighbor's friends and family, nothing has helped. Not surprisingly, the situation escalated to a point where, on a recent Saturday, Mr. Salter - according to the police report - was attacked by his neighbor from behind on his own property while simply mowing his lawn.

In an act of self-defense, Mr. Salter turned and struck his attacker, who then fled back to her home. At that point, Mr. Salter did what any responsible citizen would do: he called the police to report the attack on him. The law - which is no stranger to the attacker's address - took its course and based on the officer's findings the attacker was arrested, and based on the prosecutor's findings she was charged.

The question I have for you, and for those who are condemning Mr. Salter for this incident, is this: are you aware of this documented history of harassment perpetuated against the Salters family?

What troubles me deeply is how some in the community and some on this council either are lacking information and context, or have chosen to distort this incident, painting it as "an unhinged man hitting a helpless, elderly woman." From the facts I've seen - facts that a readily available to you as well - this narrative is factually inaccurate and also grossly unfair to both parties. It removes agency and consequence from the attacker while further victimizing Mr. Salter and his family.

It is disheartening to see how a few members of this council and some in the community are either ill-informed or are responding in bad faith, seizing this moment to engage in political opportunism, using it as a politically driven platform to discredit Mr. Salter, who has steadfastly served this town with integrity and dedication for years. This distasteful and transparent victim-blaming not only undermines Mr. Salter's long, documented history of peacefully navigating this conflict and of selfless service to this community at large, but also sets a dangerous precedent


that our community leadership tolerates harassment and physical abuse and vilifies those who stand up against it.

He would oftentimes buy me a pop and go let my dad know that I was there.

That is the Steve I know from my youth. The Steve I know from my adulthood, is a wildly compassionate man who is often the first person to greet you when seen in public.

Someone who will sit and discuss Blues and books,

a peaceful, kindhearted man who will introduce you to new friends and will bring together people from all walks of life.

A man who is *consistently working for the *betterment of this community, day-in and day-out -

whether it be from forging relationships between Whitehall and other surrounding communities

or from consistent bolstering of community activities.

I have driven through town on two separate occasions this summer and seen him bent over in front of Pitkins and the Pub, on his hands and knees pulling weeds from planters.

And just last week he was cleaning the curb on the Colby Street, broom in hand.

And When I want to know what is going on in Whitehall (or even Montague for that matter), be it an event, a street closure, updates on the storm damage, closure of the bike path - His Facebook page is the first place I visit.

In fact, out of curiosity, I scrolled Steves FB page and since June 1st ALONE he has posted or shared 196 individual posts ABOUT WHITEHALL.

either from local business or from the City of Whitehall Departments, the PD, the Arts Council, The Visitors Bureau -

Feet on The Street & Walk the Beat updates,

We get shares of the food specials from local restaurants like Gnarly Heifer, Mylan's, Pub 111... Summer hours for places like Pekadills, and Dairy Treat, we get updated when Pitkins or Police Department update their profile pictures for heavens sake.

Additionally, he highlights posts from the surrounding communities; kitchen updates from Busy Bee Cafe, Artists playing at the Montague Bandshell, and when North Grove had their fire, I learned about it first from Steve, *and* he has shared subsequent updates about the progress and rebuild I actually wanted to tally the entire amount of posts he has shared since the beginning of the year, but I legit got dizzy from all of the scrolling.

What I *see* is a man who shows up EVERY DAY for this community, and what I want to *know* is WHERE ARE THE REST OF YOU?

What are you doing daily to support us?

Because what *appears* to be happening is that a few of you are latching onto, and sensationalizing - a story of a man dealing with years of verbal and emotional abuse for *your own* personal gain. And *that* is reprehensible.

There is documented evidence of years of pathological abuse from that woman to Steve and his family. I have, and can submit, screenshots from the Whitehall police blotter - where they were called to the block of his street on 18 different occasions in the last year.

Now I'm certainly not happy that things escalated, but in the end I side with the *law enforcement on this - who made an arrest. And that person was *not Mr. Salter.

My final question is just this - What are those of you asking for his resignation doing- because what I see is a man dedicated to the community, out here helping every day, and there is not a peep from the rest of you. Dear Members of City Council,

My wife and I have owned a home on East Hanson St. and have spent significant time in Whitehall over the past 7 years. Our residence is near the homes of Amy Josephson and Steve and Leslie Salter on Livingston St.

I have recently learned that three city council members recently read letters accusing Mayor Salter of inappropriate behavior during an incident involving Amy Josephson, in an effort to force him to resign from his office as Mayor of Whitehall.

After speaking with Steve and Leslie about the incident, I discovered a public social media post by another city council member pointing at the mayor's "discraceful" (sic) behavior, inviting comments that "would help get the word out, about this despicable act, by an elected official."

Please allow me to share three brief observations and my own conclusions in support of Mayor Salter:

- 1) On June 27, 2024, wzzm.13.com reported that Amy Josephson was facing charges by the Muskegon County Prosecutor's office for allegedly punching Mayor Salter.

 Steve Salter will not be facing any charges for acting in self-defense, according to the prosecutor's office.
- 2) During the last seven years, we have personally witnessed aggressive and inappropriate behaviors exhibited by Ms. Josephson towards the Salters and the public, presumably while intoxicated. This includes screaming at the Salters from her yard and at the intersection of Livingston and Hanson Streets; placing large rocks in the middle of Hanson Street, presumably in the effort to slow down traffic; and other behaviors such as yelling and screaming between Ms. Josephson and her domestic partners during all hours of the day. These behaviors have regularly disturbed the peace in the neighborhood.

3) During our time in Whitehall, we have witnessed nothing but welcome, kindness, and hospitality by the Salters as neighbors and friends. We see them present at local events, and they regularly volunteer in activities to improve our community. I am also aware of a long history of verbally abusive behavior exhibited by Amy Josephson toward the Salters that have been met with nothing than restraint and patience.

In conclusion, I see this attempt to attack Mayor Steve Salter's reputation as petty and unfounded, both from a legal and a general conduct point of view. I would ask how any of you might have behaved while minding your own business on your personal property.

While striking anyone may not be the best desired result, I maintain that any reasonable person might react similarly when being struck from behind by surprise, whether it be inflicted by a hostile neighbor or stranger.

I believe the three council members have better things to accomplish than to single out the mayor over this incident.

I watched on July 9th as three council members spoke against our mayor and asked for his resignation. Having listened closely to the various comments more than just once but several times, I still struggled with "why". Why are you asking for his resignation? Steve was elected by a majority vote to a second term, and he's proven to be a strong, selfless and energetic leader and servant to the community. So why?

What are the facts? On May 30th there was an incident at the Salter residence between Steve and the neighbor Amy Josephson. The police were called, and a police report was made. Based on what I read in that report, it is clear to me that Amy was the instigator and the aggressor. She went to Steve's property, initiated verbal and abusive insulting language and when Steve turned away, she struck Steve in the back. The Michigan Municipal League Annual Convention will be held on Mackinac Island, September 11-13, 2024. The League's "Annual Meeting" is scheduled for 4:30 pm on Wednesday, September 11 in the Terrace at the Grand Hotel. The meeting will be held for the following purposes:

- 1. <u>Election of Trustees</u>. To elect five members of the Board of Trustees for terms of four years each (see #1 on page 2).
- 2. Policy. A) To vote on the Core Legislative Principles document.

In regard to the proposed League Core Legislative Principles, the document is available on the League website at https://mml.org/resources-research/delegate/. If you would like to receive a copy of the proposed principles by fax, please call Monica Drukis at the League at 800-653-2483.

- B) If the League Board of Trustees has presented any resolutions to the membership, they also will be voted on. (See #2 on page 2.) In regard to resolutions, member municipalities planning on submitting resolutions for consideration by the League Trustees are reminded that under the Bylaws, they must be submitted to the Trustees for their review by <u>August 11, 2024.</u>
- 3. Other Business. To transact such other business as may properly come before the meeting.

Designation of Voting Delegates

Pursuant to the provisions of the League Bylaws, <u>you are requested to designate by action of your governing body one of your officials who will be in attendance at the Convention as your official representative to cast the vote of the municipality at the Annual Meeting, and, if possible, to designate one other official to serve as alternate. Please submit this information through the League website by visiting https://mml.org/resources-research/delegate/ no later than August 11, 2024.</u>



Regarding the designation of an official representative of the member to the annual meeting, please note the following section of the League Bylaws:

"Section 4.4 - <u>Votes of Members</u>. Each member shall be equally privileged with all other members in its voice and vote in the election of officers and upon any proposition presented for discussion or decision at any meeting of the members. Honorary Members shall be entitled to participate in the discussion of any question, but such members shall not be entitled to vote. The vote of each member shall be cast by its official representative attending the meeting at which an election of officers or a decision on any proposition shall take place. Each member shall, by action of its governing body prior to the annual meeting or any special meeting, appoint one official of such member as its principal official representative to cast the vote of the member at such meeting, and may appoint one official as its alternate official representative to serve in the absence or inability to act of the principal representative."

1. Election of Trustees

Regarding election of Trustees, under Section 5.3 of the League Bylaws, five members of the Board of Trustees will be elected at the annual meeting for a term of four years. The regulations of the Board of Trustees require the Nominations Committee to complete its recommendations and post the names of the nominees for the Board of Trustees on a board at the registration desk at least four hours before the hour of the business meeting.

2. Statements of Policy and Resolutions

Regarding consideration of resolutions and statements of policy, under Section 4.5 of the League Bylaws, the Board of Trustees acts as the Resolutions Committee, and "no resolution or motion, except procedural and incidental matters having to do with business properly before the annual meeting or pertaining to the conduct of the meeting, shall be considered at the annual meeting unless it is either (1) submitted to the meeting by the Board of Trustees, or (2) submitted in writing to the Board of Trustees by resolution of the governing body of a member at least thirty (30) days preceding the date of the annual meeting." Thus, the deadline this year for the League to receive resolutions is **August 11**, **2024**. Please submit resolutions to the attention of Daniel P. Gilmartin, Executive Director/CEO at 1675 Green Rd., Ann Arbor, MI 48105. **Any resolution submitted by a member municipality will go to the League Board of Trustees, serving as the resolutions committee under the Bylaws, which may present it to the membership at the Annual Meeting or refer it to the appropriate policy committee for additional action.**

Further, "Every proposed resolution submitted to the Board of Trustees by a member shall be stated in clear and concise language and shall be accompanied by a statement setting forth the reasons for recommending the proposed resolution. The Board shall consider the proposal at a Board meeting prior to the next annual meeting and, after consideration, shall make a recommendation as to the advisability of adopting each such resolution or a modification thereof.



Regarding the designation of an official representative of the member to the annual meeting, please note the following section of the League Bylaws:

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3. Posting of Proposed Resolutions and Core Legislative Principles

The proposed Michigan Municipal League Core Legislative Principles and any new proposed Resolutions recommended by the Board of Trustees for adoption by the membership will be available on the League website, or at the League registration desk to permit governing bodies of member communities to have an opportunity to review such proposals and delegate to their voting representative the responsibility for expressing the official point of view of the member at the Annual Meeting.

The Board of Trustees will meet on Tuesday, September 10, 2024, at the Grand Hotel for the purpose of considering such other matters as may be requested by the membership, in addition to other agenda items.

The City of Whitehall has established or is a member of 16 authorities, boards, commissions, and committees with prescribed duties and responsibilities. Most operate autonomously by authority of state law or local ordinance. The City Council retains jurisdiction over budgetary approval and membership appointment of internal authorities, boards, commissions, and committees. The purpose of this policy is to develop an active, participatory, transparent, and inclusive process to recruit qualified, representative, and diverse candidates to serve in the best interest of the City and the specific needs of each authority, board, commission, or committee.

Terms expire on January 31. Members continue to serve until reappointed or replaced so as not to interfere with operations by jeopardizing the availability of a quorum. Appointments and confirmations by the City Council will be considered during the second council meeting in January.

Members are ineligible for reappointed to the same authority, board, commission, or committee having served twelve or more consecutive years. This is not a lifetime term limit. A person may be reappointed providing no less than twelve months have passed from the end of their most recent term. This restriction does not apply to persons appointed to a different authority, board, commission, or committee or appointments made by virtue of office.

Diversity, equity, and inclusion is desired but will be dictated by the availability of qualified candidates.

Appointees are restricted to serving on no more than four authorities, boards, commissions, or committees at the same time.

Every effort will be made to appoint each member of the Council to an authority, board, commission, or committee.

Appointees to the Solid Waste Authority shall be current members of the City Council.

Soliciting candidates will be posted on the City's social media platforms. Staff will advertise once in a local newspaper during the month of November. City Council members and staff are encouraged to solicit qualified candidates independent of posting and advertising.

All candidates shall submit a City approved letter of interest with a submittal deadline of January 1. During the month of November, staff will ask all appointees whose terms are due to expire if they want to continue to serve.

Residency is preferred for appointments but will be dictated by the availability of qualified candidates and membership requirements.

Training is not mandatory but is highly encouraged.

A vacancy shall be deemed to exist in any appointed office if an appointee is absent from three consecutive regular meetings, unless excused by the authority, board, commission, or committee to which they serve on.

This Appointment Policy is secondary in nature to any specific legal, statutory, ordinance, or bylaws for that particular authority, board, commission, or committee.

INTERNAL AUTHORITIES, BOARDS, COMMISSISONS and COMMITTEES

Board of Review - Review, correct, and endorse the tax assessment roll; three members; appointed by the City Council [City Charter]; three year overlapping terms; must own property and be a registered voter of the City; may not be officers or employees of the City nor candidates for office; meet in March, July, and December.

Brownfield Redevelopment Authority - Promote the revitalization of environmentally distressed areas through the use of tax increment financing; seven members; appointed by the Mayor subject to confirmation by the Council [Michigan PA 381 of 1996]; three year overlapping terms; meet in January, April, July, and October.

Construction Board of Appeals - Review and render decisions on appeals regarding the non-issuance of a building permit or decisions made by the enforcing agency regarding the building code; three members; appointed by the Chief Executive Officer [Michigan PA 230 of 1972]; two year terms; qualified by experience or training; meet as needed.

Election Commission - Appoint election inspectors and establish the date for the public accuracy testing; three members, the Clerk, Mayor, and one elected or appointed city officer appointed by the Council [City Charter]; two year terms; meet prior to each election.

Local Development Finance Authority - Eliminate the conditions of unemployment, underemployment, and joblessness and to encourage economic growth through the use of tax increment financing and the development of an industrial park; eleven members – seven appointed by the Mayor or Manager subject to Council confirmation [Michigan PA 57 of 2018], one appointed by Muskegon County, one appointed by Muskegon Community College, and two appointed by Whitehall Schools; four year overlapping terms; meet in January, April, July, and October.

Local Officers Compensation Commission - Determine the salaries of the City Council; five members; appointed by the Mayor subject to Council confirmation [Michigan PA 279 of 1909]; five year overlapping terms; must be a registered voter of the City; may not be a member, employee, or relative of a member or employee of the Council; meet in odd numbered years.

Marina Advisory Committee - Review and advise on marina operations; seven members – one councilmember, one planning commissioner, one seasonal boater, one City resident, and three from any of the following Fruitland Township, Whitehall Township, White River Township, Montague Township, City of Montague, or City of Whitehall; appointed by the Council [Resolution 90-02]; two year terms; meet in the spring and fall.

Planning Commission - Reviews and approves site plans and special uses, provides recommendations on lot splits and ordinance amendments, and develops the master plan and capital improvement plan; nine members – the Mayor, City Manager or person designated by the Manager, one councilmember, and six at large; appointed by the Mayor subject to Council confirmation [Michigan PA 33 of 2008]; three year overlapping terms, the Mayor and Manager/Designee terms coincide with the Mayors term, the councilmembers term coincides with their term; no more than two at large members can be non-residents; meet monthly, no less than two meetings per year.

Tax Increment Finance Authority - Eliminate the conditions of unemployment, underemployment, and joblessness and to encourage economic growth through the use of tax increment financing with a focus on downtown development; seven members; appointed by the Mayor subject to confirmation by the Council [Michigan PA 57 of 2018]; four year overlapping terms; meet in January, April, July, and October.

Zoning Board of Appeals - Hear and decide appeals from administrative decisions and variances; seven members, six at large and one councilmember; appointed by Council upon recommendation of the Mayor [Michigan PA 110 of 2006]; three year overlapping terms, the term of the council member shall coincide with their term; shall be qualified voters of the City; meet as needed.

EXTERNAL AUTHORITIES, BOARDS, COMMISSISONS and COMMITTEES

Muskegon County Central Dispatch - Provide policy guidance for emergency dispatch operations; one representative who shall be the city manager and one alternate; appointed by the Council [Agreement to Participate]; no specified term; meet monthly.

Muskegon Municipal Wastewater Management Committee - Oversee the enforcement and implementation of the Wastewater Master Contract in collaboration with Muskegon County; one representative and one alternate; appointed by the Council [Bylaws]; no specified term; meet monthly.

West Michigan Shoreline Regional Development Commission - The Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization oversees regional long range transportation planning and funding; one representative to the Policy Committee and one representative to the Technical Committee; appointed by the Mayor subject to confirmation by the Council; no specified term; meet monthly.

White Lake Community Library - Provide policy guidance; two representatives; appointed by the Council [Michigan PA 24 of 1989 Agreement]; four year overlapping terms; meet monthly, excluding August.

White Lake Fire Authority - Provide policy guidance; two representatives; appointed by the Council [Articles of Incorporation]; no specified term; meet quarterly;

White Lake Solid Waste Authority - Provide policy guidance on disposal and recycling of materials at the transfer station; one representative; appointed by the Council [Articles of Incorporation]; no specified term; must be a Councilmember; meet six times each year.
